Workshop 1A & 3A - Interacting with Wabanaki Maine History

Thursday and Friday, 10am - 12pm

This powerful workshop provides us an opportunity to reflect on our colonizing history as well as the current day impacts and our future with Native people. Designed for non-Native people, this workshop includes a brief history of U.S. government relationship with Native people, awareness of white privilege and an introduction to decolonization.

Operation Breaking Stereotypes Connie Carter, Co-Founder & Director Operation Breaking Stereotypes (OBS) is a non-profit organization, working with schools in Maine and New York City to facilitate exchanges among diverse groups of learners. Since our founding in 2002, OBS has helped more than 3500 students address ethnic, socioeconomic, gender, and racial stereotypes through writing, reading, music, photography, and personal connections. Connie Carter has been the director of OBS since its founding in 2002.	Workshop 1B - Challenging Perceptions, Changing Lives Thursday 10 - 11am The shared experiences of students, teachers, and past participants involved in Operation Breaking Stereotypes will illustrate how creating relationships across lines of difference enriched their education and their lives. Participants will learn ways to help students examine their own identities and stereotypes as they work for racial justice and equity.
OUTMaine Sue Campbell, Deputy Director Grace Hansen, Youth Health Educator OUTMaine is a Rockland-based organization working to make Maine communities welcoming and affirming for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ+) youth. Sue Campbell brings more than 25 years of experience working with school superintendents, administrators and other school staff through her work on local and state school boards. She volunteered with the Trans Youth Equality Foundation in Portland, assisting with support groups. As the parent of a trans son, her first-hand experience in supporting the transition process and working with family issues around transitioning give her expertise that supports both youth and families. Grace Hansen graduated from the University of Maine at Farmington in 2020 with a BA in Anthropology and International and Global Studies, with a particular concentration in Medical Anthropology. Her past work and volunteer experience has concentrated in youth development, leadership, and community health. Dr. Catharine ("Cat") Biddle Assistant Professor of Educational Leadership, The University of Maine Dr. Biddle's research focuses on ways in which rural schools and communities respond to social and economic change in the 21st century. She is particularly interested in how schools can more effectively leverage partnerships with external organizations or groups to address issues of social inequality and how non-traditional leaders—such as youth, parents and other community members—may lead or serve as partners in these efforts. Her interests are driven by her professional background in community development that leverages schools.	Keynote Presentation - "Courageous leadership in hard times: Becoming a threat to inequity in our rural communities" Thursday 12:45-1:45pm Cat has a deep understanding of rural schools and has recently been involved in a number of collaborations involving island schools, including Portrait of a Graduate and Community Learning for ME. Cat also co-authored a report that was just released this summer: <u>"What can we learn from</u> the innovation of Maine districts to support remote <u>student learning from March - June 2020?"</u> Her workshop at this year's ITC will be grounded in her Maine-based work and highly relevant for rural education more broadly.
Holocaust & Humans Rights Center of Maine David Greenham, Associate Director David Greenham is the Associate Director of the Holocaust and Human Rights Center of Maine and an adjunct lecturer of drama and Shakespeare at the University of Maine at Augusta. He has been involved with theater and community arts in Maine for more than 25 years. In addition, David has traveled to perform and teach extensively throughout Maine. Climate Education - MS/HS

Outdoor Learning - K-8

Outdoor learning has become an important COVID-19 teaching strategy. This group will share outdoor learning resources, ideas and questions, as they relate to teaching in the time of COVID and in general.

COVID-19 Wellness for Teachers

Teacher wellness is always important and is crucial during this extended period of educational disruption. This group will share health and wellness resources, ideas and questions for teachers during COVID19.

Social Emotional Learning - K-12

The COVID-19 epidemic has taken a serious toll on the social and emotional well-being of many of our students. This group will focus on social emotional learning resources, ideas and questions.

Racial Justice - K-12

As the Black Lives Matter movement has become more visible, even in our tiny rural communities, teachers are being called on to help students understand and learn from this historic moment for our country. This group will focus on racial justice education resources, ideas and questions.

Civic Engagement & Social Justice - MS/HS

Many towns and organizations are becoming more active and engaged in equity issues, providing opportunities to engage youth and adults in meaningful action. This group will focus on resources, ideas and questions related to connecting students with local and regional civic/social justice efforts.
